**SUMMARY**

- In their Arizona debut, Bill Coore and Ben Crenshaw chose 350 acres of open land for Talking Stick Golf Club. The extraordinary 36-hole facility is located on and owned by the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community. The name "Talking Stick" is derived from the traditional Pima calendar stick. The Pima Indians used the instrument to mark significant historic events occurring in a calendar year. The two uniquely divergent golf courses assure a host of memorable golf experiences, from links-style adventure through the grasslands and ingenious bunkering on the North course to a traditional style of play on the tree-lined South course. The uninterrupted desert panorama takes in the distant mountain ranges, reflecting cherished rural seclusion within an urban environment.
